What Works to Prevent Violence Against Women and Girls Evidence Review, September 2017

Summary: Thirty percent of women worldwide have experienced physical and/or sexual intimate partner violence

(IPV) in their lifetime. While IPV is experienced by all women regardless of their socio-economic status, poverty is a key driver of IPV at the individual level. The relationship between poverty and IPV is a reinforcing loop, with multiple pathways. [Read more](#)

Summary: The killing of one's parents is a neglected area in criminological scholarship, particularly in the UK, and this article presents the first national analysis of parricide in England and Wales. It draws on data from the Home Office Homicide Index to examine all recorded cases of parricide over a 36-year period and examines the characteristics of offenders, victims, incidents and court outcomes.
